# Rector's Update - January 1st, 2021

Greetings to the saints at St. Paul's,

Most of us are glad to see 2020 in the rearview mirror, and are praying that 2021 will be a better year. Perhaps the rain before New Year's helped to wash away some of the chaos of 2020. We've been through a pandemic of fear that has seen unprecedented events in our country and world. Few have not been jarred out of daily routines, and this provides opportunities (or requires us) to make choices on how we respond. In other words, a silver lining to the corona cloud is that we have gotten off autopilot, and we've had the opportunity to reevaluate what we're doing and reorder our actions to be in line with our priorities as disciples of Christ. This does not mean that our previous actions were 'bad,' but it means that the changing conditions force us to lean into the work of a disciple, or respond as fear dictates (whether that be frittering or fretting away the time). St. Augustine experienced significant ups and downs of Roman society, and he observed that the Church prospers in times of peace. He then noted that saints are crafted during times of difficultly. Perhaps that's the gift of 2020 – we've been given the opportunity to be crafted more into the image of our Lord Jesus. 2021 may also give us such opportunities, and I pray that we've grown enough in 2020 to meet them with faith, hope, and love. *Soli Deo gloria*!

I announced last Sunday that we've received new Diocesan directives about how we are permitted to gather in worship. Due to the rise in COVID-19 cases, all the churches in the Diocese are limited to gathering of 20 persons or less. Since it takes about 10 persons to handle the liturgy, music, and online broadcast, that means that only 10 additional persons will be permitted in the main church building. Most of y'all know that I have a difficult time turning people away when they are seeking to draw close to God, and that means we've had a few options to consider. The first option is to move the service outside into the breezeway, as the Diocese permits us to hold outside services without size restrictions. After considering that January and February are the coldest months of the year (not to mention the wind and wet), and how worshipping outside would impact the liturgy, music, and technology team, we've kicked around some alternatives. I've decided that the best (or maybe the least worst) option is to count the number of those handling the liturgy, music, and online broadcast, and then allow the first people who arrive at church to attend until we reach a total number of 20 in the main church. This gives an incentive to come to church early! After we reach 20 in the church, we'll have the overflow in the Parish Hall (up to 20). This allows us to handle a total of 40 on church property. If we need more than this, then we could have a third group in the Parlor (though we haven't had over 40 since this bruhaha started). We've set up some extra pews in the Parish Hall, and the big screen TV will offer a live feed of the service. NB we will continue to broadcast concomitantly on Facebook and YouTube for those not on church property. During the distribution of the Eucharist, I'll bring the consecrated hosts to those in the Parish Hall. It's serendipitous that I got a good deal on a number of silver patens last week, as we'll probably have about 5 patens in use on Sundays. It's worth noting that since these new directives will be likely be in effect at the time of our Annual Meeting, we'll probably handle the Annual Meeting in the same way (and with online streaming). See y'all on the first Sunday of 2021!

- The Parish office remains closed; however, we continue to check voicemails and emails regularly.
