HOLY EUCHARIST: RITE TWO

THE WORD OF GOD

All stand for the Processional Hymn

The people continue to stand and the Celebrant says

Blessed be God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. People And blessed be his kingdom, now and for ever. Amen.

In place of the above, from Easter Day through the Day of Pentecost

Celebrant Alleluia. Christ is risen. People The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia.

The Celebrant may then say

Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

The following hymn is sung, all standing



The Collect of the Day

The Celebrant says to the peopleThe Lord be with you.PeopleAnd also with you.CelebrantLet us pray.

The People may kneel while the Celebrant prays the Collect of the day. People Amen.

The lessons, psalm, and Gospel are printed in the bulletin.

The Lessons

The people sit and the Lector says A Reading from _____.

After the Reading, the Lector may say The Word of the Lord. People Thanks be to God.

or the Lector may say Here ends the Reading.

Silence may follow

A Psalm follows the first Reading.

At the conclusion of the Psalm, all respond with the Gloria Patria saying:

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit: as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be for ever. Amen.

The Lector continues with the second lesson saying A Reading from

After the Reading, the Lector will sayThe Word of the Lord.PeopleThanks be to God.

Silence may follow.

All stand for the Gospel Hymn. The first half of the Gospel Hymn is sung before the Gospel reading, and the second half is sung after the Gospel reading. All standing, the Deacon or Priest proclaims the Gospel, first saying:

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to _____.

PeopleGlory to you, Lord Christ.After the Gospel, the Deacon or Priest says
The Gospel of the Lord.PeoplePraise to you, Lord Christ.

The Sermon

Following the sermon, all stand for the affirmation of the Nicene Creed.

The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate: he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

The Prayers of the People (Form III)

The Leader and People pray responsively, either sitting or kneeling

Father, we pray for your holy Catholic Church; **That we all may be one.**

Grant that every member of the Church may truly and humbly serve you; **That your Name may be glorified by all people.**

We pray for all bishops, priests, and deacons; That they may be faithful ministers of your Word and Sacraments.

We pray for all who govern and hold authority in the nations of the world;

That there may be justice and peace on the earth.

Give us grace to do your will in all that we undertake; That our works may find favor in your sight.

Have compassion on those who suffer from any grief or trouble; That they may be delivered from their distress.

Give to the departed eternal rest. Let light perpetual shine upon them.

We praise you for your saints who have entered into joy; May we also come to share in your heavenly kingdom.

Let us pray for our own needs and those of others.

The people may add their own petitions.

The Celebrant adds a concluding Collect.

Confession of Sin

The Celebrant says Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

All kneeling. Silence may be kept.

Minister and People Most merciful God, we confess that we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

The Bishop, when present, or the Priest, stands and says Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. **Amen.**

The Peace

The Celebrant says to the peopleThe peace of the Lord be always with you.PeopleAnd also with you.

Then the Ministers and People may greet one another in the name of the Lord.

Announcements may be made at this time.


THE HOLY COMMUNION

The Celebrant gives the Offertory Sentence.

During the Offertory, a hymn, psalm, or anthem may be sung.

Representatives of the congregation bring the people's offerings of bread and wine, and money or other gifts, to the Deacon or Celebrant. The people stand while the offerings are presented and placed on the Altar.

The Doxology (Old 100th) is sung.



Celebrant	All things come of thee, O Lord
People	And of thine own have we given thee.


The Celebrant may also say

Celebrant Blessed are you, God of all creation. Through your goodness we have this bread to offer, which earth has given and human hands have made. It will become for us the bread of life. *People* Blessed be God for ever.

Celebrant Blessed are you, Lord, God of all creation. Through your goodness we have this wine to offer, fruit of the vine and work of human hands. It will become our spiritual drink. *People* Blessed be God for ever.

The Great Thanksgiving (Eucharistic Prayer A)


The people remain standing. The Celebrant faces them and sings or says



Then, facing the Holy Table, the Celebrant proceeds to sing or say a Proper Preface then continues

Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:

The People may kneel.

Then the Celebrant continues

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and became subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

The Celebrant continues

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. *Celebrant and People* AMEN

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

People and Celebrant Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Breaking of the Bread


The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread.

A period of silence is kept.

Then the following Fraction Anthem may be sung or said by all

S 157 O Lamb of God

Agnus Dei



Facing the people, the Celebrant says the following Invitation

The gifts of God for the people of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

The ministers receive the Sacrament in both kinds, and then immediately deliver it to the people. The Bread and the Cup are given to the communicants with these words

The Body (Blood) of our Lord Jesus Christ keep you in everlasting life. [Amen.]

or with these words

The Body of Christ, the bread of heaven. [*Amen.*] The Blood of Christ, the cup of salvation. [*Amen.*]

All Baptized Christians are welcome and encouraged to receive the Holy Sacrament at the Altar rail.

The Bread will be placed in your outstretched palm. After you eat it, the Wine may be sipped from the Chalice. If you prefer not to drink from the chalice you may leave the Bread in your hand, and the server will dip it into the Chalice and place it on your tongue. If you prefer to receive only the Bread or the Wine, or desire only a blessing, you may indicate this by crossing your arms over your chest when the Holy Sacrament is in front of you.

If coming forward to receive the Holy Sacrament is difficult, we will be glad to bring it to you at your seat. Please let an usher know if you want the Holy Sacrament brought to you.

During the ministration of Communion, hymns, psalms, or anthems may be sung. After Communion, the Celebrant says

Let us pray.

Celebrant and People

Eternal God, heavenly Father, you have graciously accepted us as living members of your Son our Savior Jesus Christ, and you have fed us with spiritual food in the Sacrament of his Body and Blood. Send us now into the world in peace, and grant us strength and courage to love and serve you with gladness and singleness of heart; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Bishop when present, or the Priest, may bless the people.

All stand for the Recessional Hymn

The Deacon or the Priest dismisses the people with these or other words

Let us go forth in the name of Christ.

The people respond: Thanks be to God!

From the Easter Vigil through the Day of Pentecost "Alleluia, alleluia" may be added to the dismissal.
